Fiction	 <u>Realistic Fiction</u>: untrue but could happen. Based in the modern era. <u>Historical Fiction</u>: fiction that is based on historical events or people. Although some facts may be true, most of the story is fictionalized. <u>Fantasy</u>: an untrue story that could never be real: it is usually characterized by dragons, unicorns, wizards, talking animals, etc. It is different from science fiction because it is not based on science <u>Science Fiction</u>: an untrue story based on a scientific element, such as space exploration, medical experiments, robots, etc.) <u>Traditional:</u> <u>Myth</u>: grew out of early people's need to explain the world around them e.g. creation myths. <u>Legend</u>: like myth except always has a hero. <u>Fable</u>: a short narrative that usually ends in a moral or lesson. Characters are animals that often act like humans. <u>Folktale</u>: traditional stories of people passed down orally e.g. fairy tales. You do not usually know the author. <u>Tall Tale</u>: exaggeration is the main feature e.g. Paul Bunyon and Johnny Appleseed.
Literary Nonfiction	Biography: a true account of someone's life. It is written by someone other than the subject of the biography. Autobiography: a true account of someone's life written by that person.
Poetry	<u>Narrative poem</u> : tells a story. <u>Lyrical Poem</u> : consists of a poem, such as a sonnet or an ode, that expressed the thoughts and feelings of the poet. Does not tell a story. <u>Humorous Poem</u> : a funny poem. <u>Free Verse</u> : does not use consistent meter, pattern, or rhyme.

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
